

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Policy Priorities

Promote & Protect Co-op Identity

- Ensure that state statutes reflect co-operative identity and protect "co-op" name.
- ✓ <u>http://www.nfca.coop/resolutions</u>

Address Obstacles to Growth in Statutes

- ✓ All Northeast states have co-op statutes, but...
- ✓ Many are outdated and do not reflect all sectors.
- ✓ Statutes protecting "co-op" name and brand not consistently enforced.

Ensure that Government Policies Support Co-ops

- ✓ Advocate for access to grants, lending, technical support & other programs
- Ensure that programs directly support co-ops and their members, particularly in marginalized communities.

Collaboration with other Sectors & Partners

✓ Working together to increase impact, harmonize priorities.





Protect Co-operative Identity



Example: Vermont

- "Uniform Limited Cooperative Association" Act (2011).
- Undermine definition of co-op as "user-owned business controlled by and operating for the benefit of their members, rather than outside investors."
- Reduce ability of co-ops and credit unions to compete.
- NFCA and allied groups developed basic talking points, lobbied state legislators.
- Recruited support of National Farmers Union, Valley Alliance of Worker Co-ops.
- ✓ Result: Statute Name Changed to "Mutual Benefit Enterprise."

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Updating Statutes

Example: Connecticut Statutes (2016)

- Grant with Farmers Union to research obstacles to co-op development.
- Statute Not Amended for 40+ Years:
 - ✓ Individual members liable for debt.
 - Cap on member share price.
 - Limitations on allocation of patronage.
- Organizing by member co-ops gets draft bill introduced.
- Testimony before committees, including support of NCBA CLUSA & CT Credit Union League.
- ✓ **Result**: Updated statute signed in 2019.

 ✓ Collaboration with NCBA CLUSA, NCB, USFWC on "Mainstreet Employee Ownership Act" Language.


 Ensuring that co-ops are included in policy initiatives and dialogs.





Farmers Union History

- Founded as "Farmers' Educational & Cooperative Union of America" (1902)
- Key role in Capper Volstead Act (1922), Co-operative Marketing Act (1926)
- Founded many agricultural co-ops & credit unions
 - Farmers Union Central Exchange (CHS) (1931)

New England Co-op Policy

- Oppose state law changes that would weaken the definition of co-operatives.
- Revitalize USDA co-operative services.
- Promote co-operative education at regional colleges and universities.
- Defend the Capper-Volstead Act of 1922.
- Cross sector collaboration.



National Policy Priorities

Protect basic legislation enabling co-operatives:

- Clayton Act of 1914
- Capper-Volstead Act of 1922 (allowing agricultural producer associations)
- Cooperative Marketing Agreement Act of 1926
- Agricultural Marketing Act of 1929
- Agricultural Marketing Act of 1937

- Federal tax rules related to co-ops

- "... attempt[s] to revise cooperative laws, administratively or legislatively, that would **diminish or jeopardize the democratic nature of cooperatives**, their unique governance structure as **member- owned and -controlled enterprises**, and ability to maintain financial and ethical integrity."
- "...new state laws that allow supposed 'cooperatives' to structure ventures with non-members in ways that give the outside investor voting control of the combined entity, including the **Uniform Limited Cooperative Association Act** statutes that undermine the democratic nature of the cooperative enterprises and the interests of producer, worker, and consumer members."





National Convention 2020

"The National Farmers Union "shall make efforts to assist in the development of cooperatives to benefit its members and the rural economy.

Efforts shall be made both legislatively and through active support of state organizations and other groups seeking knowledge of cooperative principles and law."







Valley Alliance of Worker Co-operatives Seizing the Co-operative Moment




VAWC is acting on this critical moment by launching two statewide campaigns with policy platforms:

- technical assistance, especially when carried out by associations of cooperatives,
- interagency coordination at the federal and state levels, and
- increased investment in research and development.



Characteristics of an Inclusive Economy




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Identify policies to build cooperatives that contribute to healthy communities:


